## Regional synthesis of findings

### Factors causing vulnerability

Arising from ...

- 1. Fisheries
- 2. Society
- 3. Institutions

#### 1. Fisheries

**Mobility:** increasing and more diversified; transient populations; sexual networks;

**Demography:** high ratio of single young male fishers; female fish traders;

Growing competition for fish: uncertain future; high-risk behaviour; transactional sex;

**Poverty traps:** low profit margins; enduring indebtedness; dependency and exploitation;

Short-term cash: alcohol; commercial sex;

#### 2. Society

**Gender:** women in weak economic and social position visàvis men (fishers, transporters, sexual partners);

**Social cohesion:** can be weak in transient communities; capacity to care for sick and vulnerable very limited;

**Insecurity and violence:** high levels of violence, abuse and insecurity largely unchecked; weak capacity for legal and social protection;

#### 3. Institutions

**HIV/AIDS services:** very uneven coverage by Government and NGOs; ineffective approaches; remoteness of fishing camps, high costs, lack of understanding;

**Fisheries sector:** weak understanding of roles; inadequate plans and interventions; low or no investments from fisheries revenue in HIV/AIDS response;

Lack of integration across sectors;

Lack of monitoring efficiency and impacts of interventions;



- Extension of multi-sectoral response to HIV/AIDS into fisheries;
- Integrated plans and aligned budgets at all levels to improve efficiency within Government;
- Reinvestment of fisheries revenues in HIV/AIDS response in the sector;



- Coordination of civil society initiatives and government programmes;
- Continuities and complementarities between projects and programmes;
- Learning within and across agencies and scaling-up of promising approaches;

Coordination between Government and civil society

- Improved market access for smallscale operators to help them improve their profit margins;
- Business support services and associational capacity among female fish traders;
- Improved infrastructure, standards and transparency along fish market chains;

Economic empowerment of small-scale fisheries operators

Improved security, law enforcement and capacity for legal recourse in fishing camps;

Community capacity for social protection and support for vulnerable groups;

By-laws, local 'business codes of conduct' and other initiatives that increase social and legal accountability in fishing communities;

Capacity for security, social support and rights enforcement

- Innovative service delivery to mobile fishers and fish traders and to remote fishing camps (e.g. 'fish trader +');
- Learning and adaptation of successful approach in similar target populations (e.g. 'smart card');
- Careful monitoring of the impact and cost-effectiveness of such innovations;



- Timely, standardized and independent impact assessment of programmes;
- Feedback into on-going programmes and into planning in Government and civil society;
- Adoption of best-bet options across agencies;
