This is Alonso Gonzales (CIAT) first time to join the WorldFish Science Week. As one of the partners in CRP1.3, CIAT's contribution to the shaping of the program is critical.

Alonso finds the format and agenda of Science Week interesting and an opportunity for us all to "get on the same boat" to think about how we are going the face the challenges of implementing CRP1.3.

CIAT's tropical fruits program, especially around coconut production is a "perfect match with CRP1.3" says Alonso.

Big Issues in Bangladesh

Bangladesh is one of the focal countries in CRP1.3 and typifies many of the issues faced in aquatic agricultural systems.

As a large part of Science Week is about further developing the implementation plans for the CRPs, Bill Collis, the WorldFish Country Manager in Bangladesh shared what he considered are the three key issues that need to be considered when working in a development context in Bangladesh.

As Bill says "first is poverty – 40% of the people are poor. Second is food security. Approximately 45% of the population is under nourished to some extent. And finally there are micro-nutrition issues."

With the experience WorldFish has in working with the partners in Bangladesh, Bill feels the time is right in Bangladesh for rolling out CRP 1.3 and we are now in a position to influence peoples' lives – hopefully for the better.
