#### Some of the numbers...

- **102 billion** the value (in US \$) of the world exports of fish and fishery products in 2008
- **3 billion** people who obtain at least 15% of the average animal protein intake from fish
- 700 million the number of people that depend on aquatic agricultural systems
- **15 million** the number of poor and vulnerable people that the Aquatic Agricultural Systems Program (CRP 1.3) will reach in the next 6 years
- 4 million the number of aquaculture ponds in Bangladesh
- 400,000 hectares of ponds in Bangladesh
- **44,000** farmers that directly benefited from the Development of Sustainable Aquaculture Project in Bangladesh
- 2,200 years since the integration of aquatic plants and fish farming began
- 800 CARE supported projects in 2009 (in 72 countries and reaching out to more than 59 million people
