Background on Marine Turtles


Protected under Solomon Law

 Continue to be harvested legally and illegally

 We have no idea if current harvest rates are sustainable

ALL TURTLE SPECIES

(including NEST &EGGS)



It is illegal to take turtles or eggs or destroy turtle nest or eggs during breeding seasons which is June, July& August

and November, December &

January.

\$100 fine or 3 months


 It is illegal to sell or expose for sale or buy or export any turtle or part of any turtle or the product thereof.

Penalty: for both offences imprisonment or both













Green turtle Harvest: Adult vs Juvenile





Hawksbill turtle Harvest: Adult vs Juvenile






Preliminary Results

• Turtle eggs were harvested, and even adult turtles were killed on nesting Beaches.

• Turtle products continue to be sold both in the provinces and in Honiara, and some turtle shell are sold to international markets.


TURTLES TRANSPORTED IN INTER – ISLAND VESSELS TO BE SOLD IN HONIARA














Conclusion

• Turtle catches in Solomon Islands are dominated by juvenile green and juvenile hawksbill turtles, with

- Catch rates very high and likely unsustainable in some provinces
 - Out of 580 turtles survey so far, 91% (531) recorded from Choiseul and Isabel provinces
- Weak Governance
 - Right legislation are available, but weak enforcement of existing regulations facilitate illegal take and trade.
